

#### ICE WATCH

Using dates recorded by Sylvester McNamee &, later, Donna Moodie & Gerry Greenslade, the PLCA submitted the dates the ice went out on Pike Lake from 1963 to present as well as data on 8 years the ice formed. This data, together with data provided by other citizen scientists from coast to coast to coast, provides important information about patterns in Canada's climate. Tracking & analyzing these "ice-on" & "ice-out" events is known as ice phenology.

- O Canadian ice phenology records on ice-on dating back to 1900 shows a strong trend line for the ice to form later in the year.
- O The data also shows that freshwater ice is melting earlier than before.

Donna Moodie & Gerry Greenslade report that the ice went out on April 3rd this year.

#### **CANADIAN LAKES LOONS SURVEY**

Again last year, PLCA "loonies" reported 5 loon pairs on the lake, 2 of which had 2 hatchlings. Sadly, one chick was taken from the Donnelly Bay pair by a bald eagle that has taken up residence on Big Island. The 2 chicks from the pair in the bay at Cedar Bridge Creek survived the summer.

O The eagle pair also had a hatchling which survived the summer.

Loon survey data is used to keep track of the survival of loon chicks over time. It also helps scientists monitor the health of both the loon population & the health of our lakes.

 We will need at least 10 years of data before we can make any conclusions about loon population trends on Pike Lake.

In the period from 1981-2012, some 3,200 citizen volunteers monitored loons on 4,500 lakes across Canada. Based on this information, Bird Studies Canada found that the average number of loon fledglings produced has been getting lower over time.

Due to Covid 19, the Loon Survey has been cancelled for 2020. However, we will endeavour to track loons on Pike Lake.

#### WALLEYE ENHANCEMENT PROJECT

Three years ago, the PLCA approached the Ministry of Natural Resources & Forestry (MNR&F) to discuss enhancing the walleye population in Pike Lake.

MNR&F asked the PLCA to submit a number of reports to determine if the conditions were appropriate for stocking walleye fingerlings. We have

- O Conducted Spring Walleye Spawning Observations at the priority shoal locations over 2 years
- o Provided water chemistry data on Pike Lake
- Provided information on the Septic Re-Inspection Program on Pike Lake
- Developed a program to assess angling pressure & fish harvesting in Pike Lake; 25 participants completed the Volunteer Angler Diary Survey
- Prepared a communications plan to promote & encourage the legal harvest of the Walleye's (larval/juvenile stage) predator/competitor fish species (i.e. Bass, Black Crappie & all sunfish species)

The MNR&F has a report ready to present to the PLCA Board. Stay tuned.



#### WEAR YOUR WHISTLE

Consider attaching your whistle to your lifejacket so you can signal for help in an emergency. The Canadian Red Cross recommends the pealess Fox 40 whistle because it has a loud high pitched sound & doesn't get jammed by dirt, saliva or water, like whistles with a small ball inside the chamber. They're also great to carry when you go for a walk.





#### WATCH YOUR WAKE TO PROTECT LOON CHICKS

Boat wake can drown loon nests & loon chicks. It can also cause erosion, especially in narrow boating areas.

Remember to reduce your speed to less than 10 km/h within 30 metres of any shore.

Every spring, the PLCA places 22 hazard buoys in Pike Lake to mark the location of rocks or shoals.



Did you know that Pike Lake is home to


- o 6 species of amphibians, frogs are an example




#### BE WELL WISE & SEPTIC SMART

Tips to maintain & extend the life of your septic system

- O Test your well water for bacteria at least three times a year spring, summer & fall this is a free service
- Have your septic tank pumped on a regular basis
   Every 3-5 years
- O Check & clean your effluent filter every year; if you don't have an effluent filter, consider adding one
- o Divert surface water away from your leaching bed
- Conserve water to reduce the amount of wastewater that must be treated
- o Repair leaky plumbing fixtures
- o Consider replacing inefficient toilets with low-flush models
- Spread the number of loads of laundry throughout the week

#### PIKE LAKE'S HEALTH

In examining the health of any watershed, scientists examine a number of factors including forest cover, wetlands, water quality, & shoreline cover.

Pike Lake's **forest cover** is a healthy 55.5%.

The **wetland cover** for Pike Lake is 16% which is the average level for the Tay Watershed.

Pike Lake's water quality is generally good.


 The PLCA has worked with the Rideau Valley Conservation Authority's (RVCA's) Watershed Watch Program since it was established in 2006. **Shoreline cover** The RVCA reports that pockets of Pike Lake would benefit from shoreline naturalization to protect the lake's health.

#### EFFORTS TO IMPROVE CELL & INTERNET SERVICE

In response to concerns raised by Pike Lakers, the PLCA undertook a survey to identify areas on Pike Lake that have good, adequate or no cell phone or internet service coverage. Proof of interest is found in the overwhelming response to the survey.

We sent out 130 surveys; 84 Pike Lakers, representing
 72 properties, responded.

The results of survey indicate inadequate levels of cellular phone & internet services in & around Pike Lake. A sampling of comments received:

- I have limited access & irregular cell phone service which is extremely frustrating for work. I have a booster but only it helps marginally
- We retain a rotary dial, party line for 911 emergency purposes due to issues with cell service
- Extremely inconsistent, texts may come in eventually but unable to send texts
- Internet is expensive & speed slow
- Cellular phones can only be used in certain locations mostly outside of the cottage & for short periods of time.

With the goal of improved cell phone & internet service coverage around Pike Lake, the PLCA will be sent the results to Tay Valley Township, the Township of Rideau Lakes, the Eastern Ontario Regional Network (EORN) & other key players.

 The Eastern Ontario Wardens' Caucus created EORN to advance improved rural connectivity as key to a stronger future for rural eastern Ontario communities.

With \$152m in new monies announced in 2019, plus money from private sponsors, EORN is working to improve cell coverage in eastern Ontario. For more info about EORN, visit: <a href="www.eorn.ca">www.eorn.ca</a>

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF WHAT WE'VE ACCOMPLISHED TOGETHER

The PLCA was formed after a group of men who had been shoring up the dam on Grants Creek approached the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) to have a new dam constructed.

- MNR required that a lake association be in place for this request to be met & so our lake association was formed on July 2, 1967.
- O The new dam was built in 1970 along with public access as stipulated by MNR.

Bill Nasi produced the first Cottagers Map in 1989.

Rob Bone published the first edition of the Pike Lake Post in 1994.

Assisted the townships finalize road names & PIN numbers on PL, part of establishing the 911 emergency system in this area in 2004.

Prompted by a D water quality grade in 2001, Pike Lakers started working on a lake stewardship plan.

Our Lake Stewardship Handbook was published & distributed to all properties on Pike Lake in 2011.

Mandatory Septic Inspections began in 2012.


Aili Kurtis designed our pike logo in 2012.

Denny Poley created our first website in 2012 & updated the Pike Lake map in 2014.


The PLCA received the FOCA Outstanding Achievement Award (2013) in recognition of our initiatives to protect the health of PL
